My aim will always be to have persuasive presentations based on current affairs, theological and philosophical underpinnings, and practical ideas for how we might put them into practice in order to serve our community and world.

I'm a forgiveness teacher with over 20 years of pastoral experience. As the priest in charge of the church right across the street from the former World Trade Center when the tragic events of September 11, 2001 happened, I helped start a rescue mission in that church that ultimately served over ½ million meals to first responders. The experience of what I call "9/12" is seared into my history, as well as, it seems, my destiny. I have learned many things since that time, one of which is that spiritual groups—if they want to be relevant to their communities—must be willing to think creatively and meet people where they are.

This is a lesson I had to learn the hard way by discovering the transformative power of forgiveness. I came kicking and screaming to the work of forgiveness. I thought I had it all figured out until I had to do the hard work of forgiving myself, others, and what life dealt me. I understand now that life skills such as forgiveness (yes, it's a trainable life skill) are way more pertinent to the daily life of our communities than esoteric doctrines.

On a personal note, Maria and I live in a cabin in the middle of nowhere in "The Peoples' Republic of" Zirconia with our cat Lula, our dog Maggie, and our Betta fish, Buddy. We can often be found in Charleston where we cherish our three grandchildren. We also love to travel and just bought a "vintage" 1990 VW Vanagon Camper that needs a lot of love, so we await our adventures. In the meantime, I am looking forward to working with you to deepen bonds of our fellowship.
