Secondly, it with utmost pride that I thank the out-going Board members that have served our congregation with me for the past two years (please note that Gretchen Boyd and Barbara Moffitt have served on the Board more years than they can keep track of anymore):

We have accomplished many things, large and small, since I took office two years ago:

- We rewrote our Mission Statement, as decided by the members of our congregation, and developed committees to further the Fellowship's work towards its stated goals. As a shared ministry, the Board worked with our minister to orient us by those core values.
- To be more ecologically friendly, we printed permanent, reusable orders of service and stopped using plastic ware at our refreshment table.
- Once Rev. Ernie Mills completed his contract, we invited Lyndon Harris to provide our bi-monthly sermons.
- After many years of discussion prior to my taking office, we finally changed our bylaws and did due diligence to change our name from Thermal Belt Unitarian Universalist Fellowship to Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of the Carolina Foothills.
- We created a new, enhanced website and Facebook page as well as a Google Business page.
- We provided two separate sessions of CommUnity Conversations, the first focused on forgiveness and the second on the topics of forgiveness, listening, and talking to people of opposing views. (We had to cancel the third session due to COVID-19, but hope to resume them once the coast is clear.)
- Moving to our location the historic Sunnydale log cabin, we obtained a larger, more welcoming space to grow into as well as more visibility in the community.
- We raised the funds to put on two CommUnity Coffee Houses, starting with the Deeper Than the Skin Concert with Greg Greenway and Reggie Harris and then with a CommUnity Valentine's Dance with the Jim Peterman Quartet. (These were both very well received by the community and so successful that we now have enough funds to put on another concert once it is safe to congregate in large groups again.)

As we move into our new fiscal year, please welcome our new Board members and thank them for stepping up to serve. They will now be responsible to manage our ministry's resources, communications, and committees to move us toward our mission to "…promote an open, active, and welcoming community that recognizes the worth and dignity of each human being."

It certainly has been a pleasure to serve with all of you!

#### Mastaki Family Update June 2020

As part of our social justice and community outreach, our Fellowship continues to help the Mastaki family. Robin Edgar has worked with Riziki Mastaki, who came here as a political refugee from the Democratic Republic of the Congo in the 1990s, since 2010 to navigate the daunting bureaucratic hoops to bring her parents, Dominique and Josephine to this country as legal immigrants.



About four year ago, our Fellowship's set up a separate fund for members and friends to assist with the immigrations process. Almost all of the paperwork is in place to bring her younger sibling, Sylvie, to America but, unfortunately, with COVID-19 still looming, that process has been delayed.

Now that the coronavirus has arrived in Goma, the Mastaki's son who is caring for Sylvie can no longer work. To make matters worse, Riziki's sister, Feza, just lost her 25 year-old son, Brinelle Muziga, the Mastaki's first grandson, to rebel gunfire.

The Finance Committee recently decided to send \$250 from our outreach budget to help defray the cost that the Mastaki's now face to support their family in Goma, especially since Riziki is on unemployment.
