

Monica is Making Masks!

These masks are designed to fit over the N95 masks; to assist in making the N95's last longer. All the masks are made out of 100% cotton, so they can be sterilized. The construction includes three layers of fabric; the inside layer is actually a pocket so that various types of filter material can be inserted. (I use coffee filters in mine) There is also a piece of heavy wire sewn into the top edge over the nose area so that that part of the mask can be molded to fit over peoples noses, thus ensuring a good fit.

In order to stretch some of the pretty material that people have donated, I used bleached muslin for the inside two layers. The blue ones at the top are the ones I made first. I made six of them and gave them all away to close friends. Those first six are made with three layers of the same material. Then I realized that I could make more masks if I used white muslin for the inside two layers. These take hours to make and I am hoping that our local hospital will be happy to have them. I'm attempting to get a dozen or so made first before I approach them. Meanwhile, I'm getting requests from other folks regularly and I am holding off on giving them away because I would really prefer that they go to medical usage.

I got this pattern off the Internet, after spending several hours looking for one that can really do the most good, and that can be used by medical personnel.


