

Member Profile: Jim Minshew

"A community of love" is how Jim Minshew describes Port Solarno, Florida's St. Luke's Episcopal Church, where he was rector for 23 years. It was his favorite job, much more fun than his role as Marine, accountant or embalmer. (You read that correctly... Jim paid for college working at a funeral home!)

But first things first. Born in Hartford, Alabama, Jim moved to the thriving metropolis of Panama City, Florida when he was 10. There he attended religious services in Southern Methodist, Southern Baptist, and occasionally Presbyterian churches. ("Not United Methodist," he clarifies, referring to the Southern

denomination's very conservative beliefs.) After graduating from High School, he attended Florida State and majored in Accounting. To pay for college, he drove an ambulance, and yes, sometimes embalmed bodies. Beginning in 1965, Jim served in the Marine Corps for two years, training at Parris Island, SC before being stationed in Santa Anna, CA. Jim states matter-of-factly that, from 1961 until 1972, he was "unchurched."

But he was married, the first time for nine years, and became a dad to his daughter Joann. A second marriage, this time for 18 years, gave him three more daughters, Allison, Alicia and Amy. They lived in Ft. Lauderdale where he "made more money for rich people" as an accountant. Ironically, he attended Saint Benedict's Episcopal Church in nearby Plantation, Florida, where Maria Lund and her mother were members.

In 1980, Jim decided to embrace theology and the Episcopal Church as a career, and went to seminary at the University of the South in Sewanee, TN, where he lived for three years. Upon graduation, he served as an assistant clergyman at St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Miami for two years, and finally became rector at St. Luke's for the next quarter century. During his tenure there, he met and married Janice, and they recently celebrated their 20th anniversary. Also during that time he received his pilot's license and continues to pursue his passion for flying, but admits that at age 80, he prefers to have an instructor beside him in the cockpit.

And now we have him! Jim retired from the ministry in 2008, and nine years later he and Janice moved to Forest City. Not one to sit still, Jim travels a great deal, to different states to visit his daughters and to Oshkosh, Wisconsin's annual "AirVenture," the world's largest aviation convention. Most recently, he chauffeurs adoptable pets to Humane Societies around the country. In fact, he's headed to Minneapolis this month to deliver several cats. (Who says you can't herd cats!?)
